Winter is Coming

Winter is coming. Soon the weather will be getting colder. The skies will open and the rains will fall. And we will not be interested in worshipping outside. Based on the most recent color-coded guidelines, we are not allowed to gather indoors to worship. The indoor worship of God has been deemed a nonessential practice—even if the air quality is hazardous or it is too cold or it is too hot or it is raining—we are not allowed to gather inside and worship God for any reason. I understand the safety issues. I can wrap my head around taking necessary precautions. Where I am struggling is with the lack of freedom and choice—being told, unilaterally, with no input or discussion, how I am allowed to worship God, and the limits being placed to that effect. This is wrong.

The United States of America was founded on the principles of freedom and liberty; that the people have authority over the government and elect representatives to do the will of the people. A constitution was ratified at the birth of our nation to remind the elected representatives of their role and to establish the rules that they are to follow in their respective roles. Freedom of religion is paramount in this constitution. The First Amendment states, “Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances.” In short, we are allowed to worship any way we see fit.

Yet we are told that we no longer have that choice. The Fourteenth Amendment, Section One states, “All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the State wherein they reside. No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.” Is not the choice to worship as we see fit an inalienable right afforded to us by our Creator? By what authority does the State have to deprive anyone that right?

Back in March, when the lockdowns began, I remember telling anyone who would listen that these lockdowns were a very bad idea. Not because of the safety and protection of the people, but because of the power it stole from the people. No government in human history has ever peaceably given back freedom that it has taken from the people. Fifteen days has become more than eight months with no end in sight. Businesses have been closed, many to never reopen. Many schools are closed, forcing children and youth to stare at mind-numbing screens all day in order to get a so-called education. And gathering to worship God, breaking bread around the communion table, even singing His praises, have been curtailed to parking lots and under tents. I understand the precautions and safety measures to protect

vulnerable portions of the population. But as a free and intelligent citizen, I would have liked the choice to decide to take those precautions and follow those safety measures and hold worship outside. But that freedom was taken away. Truthfully, we freely gave it away. We willingly gave up our rights.

Romans 13:1-2 reads: "Let every person be subject to the governing authorities; for there is no authority except from God, and those authorities that exist have been instituted by God. Therefore whoever resists authority resists what God has appointed, and those who resist will incur judgment." Too often we read this portion of the Letter solely from the ancient world perspective of the Apostle Paul, without properly applying his instruction to our present. Paul never could have imagined the freedom that was once afforded to citizens of the United States of America. This passage applied to our present is what makes the United States of America so beautiful and wonderful: for the first time since we left the Garden, people are free and protected to answer first and foremost to God, as opposed to a governing authority, because we the people are the governing authority! There is no authority except from God. We are subject to Him and Him alone. The elected officials of the State are under our subjugation; not the other way around.

We, the people, are free to choose what is best for us. We are free to gather and pray to God for wisdom and guidance. We are free to live our lives. We are free to love God and enjoy Him forever. We are free to joyfully respond to the love and grace He has poured out on us. We are free to worship God in our homes, in parks and parking lots, in small and large groups, and even inside if we so choose. We are free. "Therefore, since we are receiving a kingdom that cannot be shaken, let us give thanks, by which we offer to God an acceptable worship with reverence and awe" (Hebrews 12:28).

Winter is coming. May God guide us and protect us as we faithfully worship Him in our homes . . . or inside the Sanctuary. Through the Holy Spirit, may we maintain a joyful vigilance in serving God the Father alongside our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ until He returns.



Yearning for Christ



I selected a piece of music for the Advent season this year. It was composed by Craig Courtney who is a well-known choral composer. The title of the piece is The Yearning. I think this represents everything we are feeling during this season of Advent. Yearning is defined as “a feeling of intense longing for something.” We are yearning for the birth of Christ. We are yearning for the familiar worship service of years past. We are yearning for the music celebrating the birth of Jesus. We are yearning for normalcy and a chance to enjoy the holiday season with our friends and families. Most of all we are yearning for Christ in our lives.

When I was a little girl my family had a tradition of displaying a nativity set during Advent. I remember the excitement I felt to open the box with the nativity pieces and unwrap the statues one by one. We had a lovely handmade nativity that my parents had brought back from Mexico. We usually put Him in the manger on Christmas Eve after we went to Christmas Eve Mass.

We had another set of statues of the three Wisemen. They were very bright and colorful and I loved to unwrap them and display them in our home. We had an Advent Wreath and we would light the candles to represent the four weeks of Advent. These traditions are so important! They remind us that we yearn for Christ all year long. Let us turn to the story of Jesus’ birth and celebrate Him! Wishing you a Merry Christmas!




The Missing Link Is “Discipleship”

Most Wonderful Time of the Year!


December is filled with ornaments, hot chocolate, lights, green and red everywhere, baked goodies, and carols. Oh, how I love the

December 2 is our "Manger Project" from 5:00-7:00 PM. This is an opportunity for families to focus on the true meaning of Christmas while building a wooden manger.


First: Enjoy a time of fellowship with a meal.

Hi there family and friends,


Thank-ful (adjective) 1. Feeling gratitude: feeling or expressing gratitude. 2. Glad about something: glad or relieved about something.


